In a state experiencing constant development, they also offer much-needed green spaces that are not only beautiful but also offer habitat to an amazing diversity of wildlife.

At last count, more than 5,000 items contained forest products. The assortment of "Goods from the Woods" is very diverse and continues to grow. For example, the materials working forests provide are used to build our homes, print our newspapers, landscape our yards and manufacture our furniture. Forests products are also found in the screens on our cell phones, televisions and computers; in our shampoos and other cosmetics; and in medicines, sports equipment, food and much more!

Too many emails these days feature signatures advocating against printing in order to save trees. Florida Forests Week is the perfect time to correct the wrong thinking behind that movement. Goods from the Woods: Florida's Forests in Your Daily Life

Walk into any Florida home, and the fingerprints of our state's forests are everywhere—from the sturdy pine floorboards underfoot to the roll of paper towels on the counter. These aren't just materials; they're the quiet output of working forests that span 17 million acres, turning trees into over 5,000 everyday essentials we often take for granted. As Florida Forests Week unfolds from October 26 to November 1, it's a prime chance to unpack "Goods from the Woods," celebrating how sustainable management keeps these resources flowing while safeguarding the environment.

Start with the basics. Pine from North Florida forests forms the backbone of homes. Beyond building, these woods yield paper products galore: the ream in your printer, the cardboard box from your last online order, even the tissue box by your bedside.

But the bounty doesn't stop at the obvious. Peek into your medicine cabinet, and you'll find aspirin derived from willow bark, bandages with cellulose adhesives, and lotion smoothed by pine resins. Your kid's crayons? Pigments from tree extracts. The Gatorade quenching post-game thirst? Stabilizers from wood gums. Even tech gadgets have forest ties—LCD screens in cell phones rely on cellulose films, while skateboards and baseball bats swing from laminated hardwoods. And don't overlook the surprises: bug repellent with pine oil, charcoal for your backyard grill, and ice cream that uses forest resources for extra creaminess, all sourced sustainably to avoid depleting our woodlands and the environmental benefits they provide.

Certifications like the Sustainable Forestry Initiative guide it all, promising products that don't just sustain us but the land, too. Forests provide habitat for wildlife, filter our air, improve water quality and quantity, and create beautiful green spaces in a state that is rapidly developing.

Goods from the Woods remind us that forests renewables, not relics. By creating strong markets for wood products —whether flooring or facial tissue—we support sustainability. This Florida Forests Week, let's tip our hats to the woods that build, heal, and hold our world together, one pine at a time.
